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Sustainable Thornbury Energy Tip of the Week

Did you know?

In most homes, lighting accounts for around 10-15% of an electricity bill.

Reducing your Lighting costs

- Always turn off the lights when you leave a room.
- Open the curtains to make the most of available natural light
- Think about painting rooms in lighter colours
- Choose light-coloured lampshades or ones which do not block the light
- Replace your light bulbs with energy saving recommended ones -
- Energy Saving Recommended bulbs work in the same way as fluorescent lights. An electric current passes through gas in a tube, making the tube's coating glow brightly. Traditional bulbs waste a lot of their energy by turning it into heat.
- Replacing just one bulb with an energy saving one can reduce your lighting costs by up to £100 over the lifetime of the bulb. They also last, on average up to 12 times longer than ordinary light bulbs.
- There are now many different types of bulbs and fittings available, including downlighters, candle and spotlights
- Look for the Energy Saving Logo to find Recommended bulbs



- Energy saving products use less energy and therefore have less of an environmental impact, as well as being cheaper to run.
